

INTRODUCTION

The experience of war, and how to respond to its consequences, has always been a significant and problematic issue. With this year marking the centenary of WWI, there has been much recent discussion about how war should be commemorated, and war as a concept has become a prevalent theme in the media. This exhibition tracks representations of war from 14th century Egypt to WWII Britain. It begins by looking at the technicality of military weaponry, moving onto sieges and battles and then to a general chronological perspective. The exhibits vary in their focus and emotional attitude to war, but all provide valuable evidence of how individuals and societies have documented their memories of different conflicts throughout history.

WEAPONRY

Vegetius, De Re Militari Delta.3.1(2)

A 17th century printing of a 5th century Roman military text, with a focus on the 'strategy' of war and illustrations of various military techniques.





Muhammad ibn Manglī, The Book of Devices for Wars, Conquest of Cities, and Protecting **Mountain Passes** MS 83

A 14th century Egyptian manuscript, written in Arabic and focussing on military equipment, with

highly decorative illustrations. Written by a Mamluk officer of the guard who attributed the text to Alexander the Great.

SIEGES AND BATTLES

The Siege of Caerlaverock, MS 174

An illustrated French poem describing of the siege of a Scottish castle by the English army in 1300, with particular attention paid to the heraldry of the participants.

THE 17TH CENTURY AND THE ENGLISH CIVIL WAR (1642–1651)



Cannon Ball

Always on display in the Library, the cannon ball is said to date from the English Civil War, apparently fired at the then Royalist College by Roundhead soldiers.

THE 19TH AND EARLY 20TH CENTURIES

Newspaper publication of Robert Louis Stevenson's The Body Snatcher, although the focus here is on 'The Pall Mall Prizes' competition section, which asks readers to predict the outcome of

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British military action in Sudan during the Madhist War (1881 - 89).

Poems written by the St John's alumnus about the destruction of the innocent, idyllic county life by the Boer War; they gained a new poignancy and increased readership after the outbreak of WWI.

Who?" (1973) and *Mussolini: His Part in my Downfall* (1978). Also included are a contemporary newspaper review and personal telegram relating to the former work.



Gertrude Stein, *The World is Round* (London: B.T. Batsford Ltd., 1939) and *Wars I Have Seen* (As above, 1945) ML-6R-02; ML-6R-03

Both books belonged to Robert Graves; the first contains a letter to him from Stein referring to WWII, and the second relat-

ing to Stein's own experiences of living through both World Wars.
